“Why does my child need immunizations?”

The Facts About Immunizations

Only 74 percent of Colorado’s children entering kindergarten are up to date on their immunizations. Vaccine-preventable diseases are still around. Each year in Colorado and El Paso County, children suffer from preventable diseases such as pertussis (whooping cough) and chickenpox. Make sure you start your baby on his or her shots by two months of age and get shots on time, every time.

“What does my child need?”

Immunizations from birth through age 6

*Hepatitis B

Birth, 2 months and again between 6 and 18 months

Rotavirus

2 months, 4 months and 6 months

*DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis)

2 months, 4 months, 6 months, between 15 and 18 months, and between 4 and 6 years

*Hib (Haemophilus Influenza type b)

2 months, 4 months, 6 months, and again between 12 and 15 months

*Pneumococcal diseases such as meningitis

2 months, 4 months, 6 months and again between 12 and 15 months

*Polio

2 months, 4 months, between 6 and 18 months, and again between 4 years and 6 years

Influenza

Annually in autumn, beginning at 6 months of age

*MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)

Between 12 and 15 months and again between 4 and 6 years

*Varicella (Chickenpox)

Between 12 and 15 months and again between 4 and 6 years

Hepatitis A

1 dose after 12 months of age and again 6 to 12 months later

Meningococcal diseases

For members of high-risk groups as directed by physicians.

* These immunizations are required by Colorado for entry to child care centers, preschools and school.
